Daily Schedule:

Most classes will meet synchronously (live and virtual) on the first day of class. Teachers will contact students to communicate how to join the class session. For the remainder of the session, depending on the class, classes may be mostly asynchronous or a blend of synchronous and asynchronous learning. When classes meet synchronously, they will follow the schedule below.

Teachers will communicate class activities following the format outlined in the daily schedule (see below). This means that by 9 a.m. on the day the class would meet, teachers will send information to each class they would normally see that day. Students are expected to attend all synchronous lessons (live virtual) for their class. If a student is not able to attend a session, the student needs to make arrangements with the teacher to make up the learning experience.

Please note: **Registration online does not guarantee a seat in a course.** You will receive an email notification when your registration has been received and another email notification when a seat in the class has been confirmed. Although we will do our best to accommodate your course requests, please note that class sizes are limited and subject to available staffing.

Classes with insufficient enrollment will be cancelled. Students will be notified if a class they are registered for is cancelled and their tuition will be refunded.

Summer School Fees and Payment Information

0.5 credit: \$210, 0.25 credit: \$110

Tuition is refundable prior to the start of the class with the exception of a \$25 processing fee. No refunds will be issued once the semester begins. Any credit-bearing course that is dropped after classes begin will not receive a grade and will be marked NG as long as the drop is not a result of disciplinary action.

Tuition fees must be paid at the time of registration by credit/debit card, e-check, check, cash, or money order.

Credit/debit card payments are preferred. We accept Visa and Mastercard.

Students seeking credit recovery during summer school will be able to attend for FREE. In order to assure that you are NOT charged for a credit-recovery summer school class, you should select the "cash/check" payment option when you register online.

An out-of-district surcharge will be added to all registrations for students not living in the District 207 attendance area. The surcharge will be \$200 for 1 credit, \$100 for 0.5 credit, and \$50 for 0.25 credit

Financial Assistance

Financial assistance for academic courses is available to students who are enrolled in District 207 for the 2019-2020 school year and who qualify for reduced-price lunch or free lunch. Financial assistance is NOT available to incoming freshmen.

Students who qualify for <u>free lunch</u> for the 2019-2020 school year will receive a one-time discount of \$100 for any one course. Students who qualify for <u>reduced-price lunch</u> will receive a one-time discount of \$50 for any one course.

Students seeking credit recovery during summer school will be able to attend for FREE. In order to assure that you are NOT charged for a credit-recovery summer school class, you should select the "cash/check" payment option when you register online.

Attendance

Because coursework is concentrated and equals the work assignments that would be received in a regular school year, attendance, punctuality, and on-time assignment completion are essential for success. One day in summer school is equivalent to five or six days in the regular school year. Students are expected to attend all synchronous lessons (live virtual) for their class. If a student is not able to attend, they need to make arrangements with the teacher to make up the learning experience.

Expectations for Online Learning

Students are expected to follow school norms and rules just as they do when physically present in the school building. In addition, students should:

- Only attend video sessions for their classes.
- Follow the acceptable use policy for electronics. Do not share any screenshots, photos, or videos of a live or recorded video classroom session.
- Be on time to virtual class sessions.
- Wait your turn to speak.
- Follow all procedures established by your teacher.
- Keep in mind the feelings and opinions of others, even if they differ from your own. Inappropriate language, images, or gestures will be handled just as if they occurred at school.
- Find a neutral backdrop (closed closet door, blank or minimally decorated and/or appropriate wall) when you are on video to minimize distractions to others in the session. Remember, you can always join without video.
- Dress appropriately. The dress code also applies for a video classroom session.

Pass/Fail Grades

If a student elects to take a course Pass/Fail, he/she must complete the Pass/Fail form prior to the end of the 2^{nd} week of the summer school session. Courses that are required for graduation may not be taken as pass/fail.

Chromebooks & Textbooks

Students will need a school-issued Chromebook for summer school. Incoming freshmen who are enrolled in summer school will be allowed to pick up a Chromebook for use during summer school. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors should already have a school-issued Chromebook. Information regarding Chromebook pick-up for incoming freshmen will be communicated in late spring from the student's home school.

Academic Course Offerings

Summer school courses are offered based on sufficient enrollment, staff availability, and/or until the class is filled. When a course is available at the student's home school, he/she must take the course at the home school and not one of the other school buildings.

Time: Required synchronous orientation session

Session 1: June 15th 2:00pm - 3:00pm

Session 2: July 6th 2:00 - 3:00 pm

For: District 207 students only in 10th, 11th, 12th grade

Credit: 0.25

This one quarter credit course will cover the following topics: savings, banking, interest, credit, taxes, insurance, investing, consumer fraud, renting vs. owning, and financing higher education. This webbased course offers students a high level of rigor with an alternative method of instruction and demands more self-direction than the traditional classroom experience. Therefore, students enrolling in this course are expected to have a high level of computer literacy and familiarity with Microsoft Office and file management operations. All assignments will be delivered via an online platform. In addition, students will use a discussion board to post responses to the class and the teacher. This course fulfills the State of Illinois consumer education requirement. A comprehensive letter detailing class expectations will be sent to all enrolled students before class begins.

Prerequisite: Credit Recovery only

Students who have received an unsatisfactory grade in the corresponding English class during the regular school year may repeat it in summer school.

These courses focus on three areas of English: language, literature, and composition. The emphasis in language is on developing and improving vocabulary, grammar, and mechanical skills. In literature, students are exposed to the various literary genres and work on reading, understanding, and discussing pieces of literature. The focus in composition is on developing strong sentence writing, paragraph writing, and longer and more complex writing, along with strong research skills.

Time: Early session 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. or Late session 11:30 a.m. - 1:30 p.m. (choose 1)

For: 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th grade

Credit: 0.25

Prerequisite: None

This course develops communication skills critical for success in the 21st century. The focus is on the fundamental aspects of social media and networking ethics, presentation technology, verbal and nonverbal communication, self-esteem, charisma, affect, and oral presentation. Students will build speaking and listening skills as well as poise, self-confidence, and the ability to communicate effectively. Communication Arts is required for graduation.

The health curriculum focuses on creating an environment supportive of healthy behavior. The curriculum effectively impacts the physical, emotional, and social well-being, thereby increasing the likelihood that young people will develop healthy lifestyle practices.

Algebra 1 Part B ONLINE

For: 11th, 12th grade

Credit: 0.5 each semester

Prerequisite: Credit Recovery only

Students who have received an unsatisfactory grade during the regular school year may repeat the course during summer school.

Algebra 1 Part B is the second half of a first course in algebra. The topics include graphing of linear and quadratic functions and inequalities, systems of equations, and quadratic functions and applications.

Credit: 0.5 each semester

Prerequisite: Credit Recovery only

Algebra 2 is the study of linear and quadratic equations, systems of equations, matrices and determinants, functions (linear, quadratic, inverse exponential, logarithmic, polynomial, and rational), powers, roots, radicals, and quadratic relations.

Time: 9:00 a.m. - 1:30 p.m. For: 10th, 11th, 12th grade Credit: 0.5 each semester

Prerequisite: Credit Recovery only

Students who have received an unsatisfactory grade during the regular school year may repeat the course during summer school.

Students learn and apply the basic properties and relationships of points, lines, angles, triangles, quadrilaterals, circles, transformations, and solid figures with numerical problems that integrate arithmetic, algebra, and geometry. Students apply logic and deductive reasoning in a transformational-based approach to geometry concepts.

Introduction to Computer Science ONLINE

Host School: Maine West

Offered: Semester 1
Time: Asynchronous

For: 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th grade

Credit: 0.5 each semester

Prerequisite: None

This course covers basic data types, input/output statements, basic math operations, random values, conditional statements, and loops. Students are prepared for computer science using Java. Chromebooks are NOT an option for this class. Links to all course materials/deadlines will be provided via email prior to the beginning of summer school. All course materials, including software, are free. Instructions detailing how to install the required software and turn in assignments will be emailed prior to the first class and can be found here: tinyurl.com/summerCS-day0

Students will receive information from the instructor in advance of June 15th. Students will be asked to successfully install the required software and turn in a straightforward programming assignment before the June 15th start date. If students need assistance with this process, they should reach out to the instructor to set up a time to meet virtually for support.

Civics and Government ONLINE

Offered: Semester 1

Time: 9:00 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.

For: Pre-approval required. Available only for incoming 12th graders who demonstrate a need

based on their senior year schedule. Please see your counselor for more details.

Credit: 0.5

Prerequisite: U.S. History, AP U.S. History, or American Studies

Civics and Government is a one-semester required course in the structure and functions of the American political system on the federal, state, and local levels. Through simulations, service learning, and discussion of controversial issues, students will develop their level of civic engagement and ability to participate in our American democracy. The U.S. Constitution, Illinois Constitution, and Flag Code assessments which students are required to pass for graduation, are given in this course. To register for this class, students must obtain a pre-approval form from his/her counselor, meet with the Social Science Department chair in their building, and complete a separate paper registration form.

U.S. History ONLINE

Host School: Maine South, Maine West

Offered: Semester 1. Semester 2

Time: 9:00 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.

For: 12th grade

Credit: 0.5 each semester

Prerequisite: Credit Recovery only

U.S. History covers the history of our country from the age of exploration to the present. First semester ends with the Reconstruction period. Second semester covers 1877 to the present day.

World Cultures ONLINE

Host School: Maine South

Offered: Semester 1, Semester 2

Time: 9:00 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.

For: 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th grade

Credit: 0.5 each semester

Prerequisite: None

World Cultures traces the development of cultures in East Asia, India, Latin America, Africa, and the Middle East. The focus of the course is the role of individuals, resources, and environment on the development of a culture. This course also includes an overview of modern genocide that may include

genocides in Rwanda, Sudan, Cambodia, and Armenia. Included in the course is skill development in the areas of geography, reading, and writing. *This course must be taken for the full 6 weeks of summer school (both semesters) unless the student needs a single semester for credit recovery.*
